





PROGRAM COMMITTEE:

Chairman Mike Lovelady announced that this Committee will be meeting to plan the programs for the rest of the year and that they would be announced to further interest in the subjects.

FIRE PUMP COMMITTEE:

Lester Crooks announced that fabrication of portable skidmounted units as planned are in progress with the first expected to be operational within a month and all three operational within three months.

FIRE TRAINING GROUNDS:

Ezra Gordon reported the grounds were in good shape. He also reported that dirt and sand is needed at the fire field for fill and leveling and that backhoe and/or grader operators would be appreciated. He reported that two welding mechanics are working on the chemical complex, but more may be needed to finish the project by the time the Industrial Fire School starts.

Dr. Ensign reported that field restrooms are currently being installed adjacent to the sprinkler system evolution. He further reported there will be separate units for the two genders.

Ezra Gordon reported that, following the industrial school, the overhead pipe rack project will be renovated. He also warned - if you haven't helped with the chemical complex project, look out, you'll get hit hard on the pipe rack project.

INDUSTRIAL FIRE TRAINING BOARD QUALIFICATIONS:

Ed Harris explained the packet of material recently mailed by the State Firemen and Fire Marshalls Association of Texas concerning participation in the Industrial Training Section. He reminded all that Industrial Fire Training participants have 78 members in the State of Texas, but that Orange/Jefferson counties have, probably, about 48 eligible, but only 1/3 of those are members. Ed reminded all that training was a part of 1910.120 and that an OSHA visit in 1990 to an industrial site indicated OSHA was generally satisfied if that industry was an Industrial Fire Training participant as indicated by the Fire Board.

Ed also gave additional information on registration of emergency vehicles (required for industrial vehicles) and the fee of \$25/vehicle covers two years. The stickers give the participant the right to operate on public roads as an emergency vehicle.

CRITICAL INCIDENT STRESS DEBRIEFING:

Gary Duncan and Don Bailey announced that in conjunction with Lamar University and the John Gray Institute, a three-day course was being developed to help firemen, police and any others, who routinely are exposed to violence, to cope with the stress it fosters. It is expected this course will be available by October.

HAZWOPPER TRAINING:

All were cautioned to check the credentials of organization being used to provide training. After March 6, 1990, that organization must be on a accredited list or the training is not valid.

Melvin Schmidt - Chevron, announced that their Hazardous Waste Coordinator, Mr. Robechauex had obtained a 70-barrel vacuum trailer that could be used by members of the organization upon request for an emergency.

Recent emergencies were discussed.

PROGRAM:

Mike Lovelady introduced Lynn Fultz, a representative of Emtech, who presented a program on "Hazmat Specialist - First Response". Briefly, Mr. Fultz reported that:

- 1. First responders must be trained per 1910.120.
- 2. Identify the material.
- 3. Contain the problem (anything to prevent spread).
- 4. Provide a Site Safety Plan to provide for safety of public and participants.
- 5. Better you perform Step three, the easier to clean up.
- 6. Provide a definite disposal plan.
- 7. First responder required to report to TWC & EPA.

The 491st meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon.







After discussion with numerous Rescue Training Professionals, we have concluded that the Rescue Project at the Fire Department Training Center needs to be advanced to provide top-quality instruction. The improvements would provide us with a competition-type rescue project, far superior to what we now have. Training will be vastly enriched with these additions and provide a better learning experience for students.

The following materials will be required for the upgrade:

- 1. 50' high x 10' diameter Reactor Tower with caged ladders and catwalks (multiple openings).
- 2. Railcar or tank truck for rescue operations with multiple manways and multiple internal baffles.
- 3. 36" horizontal pipe connecting current vessel to Reactor Tower (approx. 25' to 30' long).
- 4. Catwalks connecting all three vessels.
- 5. Ventilation fans on all vessels (attic-fan type with protective screen).
- 6. Secure storage area for training equipment.

Please consider financing the improvement of this project. Superior training makes every department stronger. Thank you for your commitment to the training facility and your time. I look forward to your reply.



The 497th meeting of the Sabine-Neches Chiefs Association was called to order by Ed Harris at 10:00 A.M., on September 5, 1990, at the Ramada Inn in Port Arthur, Texas. (List of attendess attached)

Invocation was given by Curtis Holden.

David Mc Millian representing host organization, Boeing Petroleum addressed the group, expressing appreciation for the organization and their role in the organization. He further stated that the value of the mutual aid effort was recognized by the Department of Energy because their direction had been to seek out and become involved in the local Mutual Aid effort. Later in the meeting Carl Anderson, Fire Chief for Boeing Petroleum from New Orleans was introduced and expressed his appreciation.

Self introductions were made by all those present.

The minutes of the 496th meeting were read and approved.

Ed Harris and Dr. Gary Ensign, Lamar University, reported that efforts had been made, with written support by some plant managers with letters to Congressmen, to establish a spill response center in this area. Dr. Ensign reported that a decision is expected by the middle of the week of September 10th, 1990.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

Dr. Ensign reported that a seminar on firefighters safety will be conducted on Friday, November 9. The program is directed to volunteer and municipal personnel but could also be tailored to industrial needs. (Brochure attached)

Ed Harris reported that a task force is considering issues around the need for and advisability of a certification program for Industrial Fire Fighters. The task group leans toward requiring certification, but the group is developing a questionnaire to industry to try to determine what would be needed. The questionnaire will go to NPRA, TCC and API members.

Lester Crooks reported on the success and problems of the "Large Volume Pumps" test that was conducted last month. The need for further updates of portable pump capability and means of deployment and principles of use become apparent during the test. He reported that by year end, pumping capability of 10,000 - 15,000 gpm would be available and 25,000 feet of 5" hose on hose trailers would be available also. Lester indicated that another "drill" could and should be conducted in the spring of 1991. Lester also expressed appreciation to the Red Cross for providing refreshments during the test, that handling hose was hot and thirst provoking work.

Dr. Gary Ensign announced that John Hubacek, from Texas A&M is new Director of the Lamar Industrial Fire School.

Attached to the minutes is a brochure concerning a seminar on "Critical Incident Stress Debriefing For Emergency Services Personnel" to be held November 8th, 9th, and 10th at the Beaumont Civic Center.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

<u>spill responses</u> - Capt. Whiting reported that a drill had reflected a lot of needs on water front response. A Committee, Chaired by Capt. Whiting is working on a questionnaire to determine the water front response capability of the SNCA. More details will be developed when Capt. Whiting is less involved in the logistics of the Persian Gulf Military Response.

FIRE TRAINING FIELD - D. A. Bruce reported that conditions are good with some general work in progress. Dennis reported the oil (fuel) reclamation program had worked so well that we now had an environmental problem of disposing of the sludge which is non-burnable. Members of the organization were requested to assist in developing correct method of disposing of the sludge.

Recent emergencies were discussed.

Captain Whiting presented a very interesting review of the event and actions to extinguish the fire and contain the spill associated with the explosion and fire on the oil tanker, Mega Borg off the Galveston coast. He presented some non-official views of the events and some lessons learned.

The meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon.





Firefighter Safety Workshop will be held, Friday, November 9th, 1990, at the Beeson Building Auditorium at Lamar University (registration form attached). To date four municipal and twenty two industry employees have signed up for the course.

Brochures for the 22nd Annual Lamar University Firefighters Training School, for municipal and industrial fire protection to be held May 13-17, 1991, should be out in two weeks. Plans are under way to improve quality, and variety of field evolutions. Also discussed was the rising cost of fuel, food, supplies and other essentials that has forced the school rates on fire training services to increase. Summary of answers to the Fire Fighter's Certification questionnaire will be sent out next week.

Dan White representing Vallen Safety Supply Company presented a check for \$200.00 to the organization.

Glen Durham of Williams Boots & Coots, presented a video tape of a ship fire on the Sagnaw River out of Bay City, Michigan which they were called on to fight. The tape was made by the Coast Guard. The fire was almost impossible to extinguish from "off" ship. The ship was 400 feet long and had eight compartments. They had to board the ship and put dry chemical on the vent fires.

Bill Roe of Southern Union Gas presented a program on alternate fuel for vehicles. In response to the Federal Clean Air Act and also the State Legislature, some fleets and fleet owners are to convert vehicles to alternate fuel or compressed natural gas (CNG). Private fleets should convert approximately 30 per cent of all their trucks to alternate fuel by 1994. There will soon be service outlets and service stations. A video was shown on the testing of the CNG cylinders that are being installed in automobiles and trucks. On display was several vehicles that had been converted.

The meeting adjourned at 12:00 noon.




